The Leopard - Giuseppe Di Lampedusa 2007-11-06

Five Stories of Ferrara - Giorgio Bassani 1971

The stories and novels that were to make him famous abroad began to appear in the 1950s. They include *A Prospect of Ferrara* (1960), and *The Gold Rimmed Spectacles* (1960). A film version of *The Garden of the Finzi-Continis* (1962) by Vittorio De Sica has become a public television classic.
